IMPACTFUL GOALS

I am feeling conflicted at this moment. A little scared, excited, and definitely hopeful. I should be relieved to take my child to her first day of school. I mean, I am the **only** teacher that she ever has known. She needs a teacher with more experience because I don't think my teaching methods are working like they should. I came to that conclusion a week ago. I had been trying to get her to sound out her letters, but after only 5 minutes of working with my daughter on the alphabet she started to rock back-and-forth....faster and harder, then swung her arms around and yelled. My ears rung for 10 minutes! I had been getting frustrated a lot recently because I hit a brick wall with her education that I can't get past. It wasn't long after hitting this wall that my friends recommended I enroll her in school, after all there the new law passed that allows my daughter to have a place in the public school classroom. Trained teachers will know much better than I do how to get around the wall I've hit. This is great, so why am I so scared? These thoughts are flooding my mind and I am almost at the school's office. From there I get the class number and then, well...... will the teacher treat her well? Will the teacher know what sounds and movements my daughter uses to communicate for her different wants and needs? What if I forget to tell the teacher something important? I should just go back home. This is a mistake. (Hand on the office doorknob. Stops and shakes head "no".) No, I have to do this for my daughter to grow and develop. I asked the office staff for my daughters classroom number and she stated that her class is outside in the portable. I thought, don't jump to conclusions, just head out there and check it out. But, why is she separated from her non-disabled peers? (Walked outside to the portable area pushing the wheelchair her daughter is confined to and stopped in shock.) Did they not know that a lot of disabled children have problems walking! Why would they put the classrooms on unpaved lots that are nothing but clumps of weeds and sugar sand? Fight through it. Let's go! (Pushes chair with extreme difficulty, in the growing Florida heat up to the classroom building). I made it! Stairs?! (Pulled chair up backwards into the classroom.) No way! There is no organization to this room. No learning posters on the wall. Just a ty playing a cartoon video tape. The students out number the teacher by 15:1. How will she handle it if there is a situation? She definitely will not have enough time to give to my daughter. No time means no understanding how she communicates and learns, and it is so hot! No air?! Do they think these children are animals, that their comfort doesn't matter? I have a choice, but what about parents who don't? I hate to leave any of them in this room, but I will not be leaving my child here today, nor anytime I can foresee.

This story happened 30 years ago. Although our country and our educational system has made great strides since then, when a new client enrolls into our day program they reflect that there is still a long way to go in receiving a quality public education. An education that equips them for transition into independent adulthood. Most of our clients test at only a 3rd or 5th grade level and have no concept of monetary value. Many have not been equipped with the skills to tend to their environment in a way that keeps it and them hygienic and safe. Further, most of our new clients have not even attempted to cook nor have they engaged in any activity that would help them understand how to follow a recipe, store food properly, know if food was outdated, or know if their food contained an allergen that was harmful to them. Our Society should have a *unified goal* to provide an education for people with disabilities that equip them to live with independence as safely and productively as possible. This may entail extending educational funding to day programs like ours that offer focused lessons for independence. Whatever the plan is to be implemented; a plan to include lessons to equip children with disabilities with skills for independence is an impactful goal for the entire country!

We have seen many clients with various degree of abilities come through the P.O.P. day program. Some have moved on to work in the community. We have found placement of our students difficult due to a few factors. The clients were limited to positions inside businesses within a 3 block radius of the program. Businesses outside the immediate area were unaware of our client's wishes and ability to work. The potential employers were limited to employee options that were presented by staff advocates. In order to get information of our IDD clients and other community members with IDD in front of a wider range of employers we had to think outside of the box. That is when we came up with the Friends Work List website. This website promotes people with disabilities wishing to work by allowing employers to review employment candidates resumes and profiles. It also helps families find businesses who support people with disabilities. This website is a great tool for employers who are looking to improve diversity in the workplace.
